"The onset of mental illness is frequently in the teenage years and our campaign aims to take a preventive stance. It costs so much more to treat people at the crisis stage of mental illness than to focus on maintaining positive mental health. People need to know they are not alone and there is always professional help and support available."

As part of the activities planned for National Mental Health Week the MHCA will be running a national photography competition and will also hold private screenings of the new Australian movie 'Mental' starring Toni Collette and Anthony La Paglia in Sydney and Canberra.
